




SUMMER TERM 1 NEWSLETTER - 26TH MAY 2023

Headteacher's Message

And before we know it, we are halfway through the Summer Term, a term which has been very busy and packed with lots of events and visits which the children have gained a great deal from. We hope you enjoy reading all about our news and events from this half term.

Staffing: I am delighted to share that we have appointed Mrs Goodfellow, our Year 2 teacher, to cover the interim Deputy Head Teacher role whilst Mrs Guarguaglini goes on maternity leave. We know that Mrs Goodfellow will be an excellent appointment to support the new headteacher, Cheryl Smith, in continuing to ensure that all pupils receive the very best education. This means that we have a vacancy for a class teacher. Again, it is with delight that Mrs Emsen, who has been teaching in Year 3, has agreed to be part of the Bearwood team. Congratulations to both Mrs Goodfellow and Mrs Emsen. Mrs Ramsay, EYFS lead, is also moving onto pastures new where she is relocating to London. I would also like to share with you that Mrs Ramsay is also getting married over the summer holidays and we would like to wish her all the very best to her and her future husband.

We have appointed an experienced EYFS lead, Sally Ladyman, who will officially lead EYFS from September.

I am sure you will make her feel welcome.

We have also appointed Tiffany Watts who has been a student teacher for the past year. We know that she will flourish in her teaching career as she becomes part of the team.

At the start of this half term, Years 5 and 6 had an assembly led by a charity called Escapeline. Caroline, who works for this charity, explained that she was here to talk to the children about county lines and defined this as where illegal drugs are transported - usually by children, sometimes as young as eight years old.

During the follow-up workshops in classrooms, Caroline talked through the different stages and methods which gangs will use to recruit children to deliver packages. Pupils spent some time thinking about what gang members might look like and many were surprised to learn that they usually look 'normal' and 'nice' and very unsuspecting! Caroline also led a conversation about knife crime and the dangers of this in relation to county lines.



At the beginning of the summer term, Willow 2 walked to Canford Park SANG as part of our Geography learning. We walked along the new residential area being built next to school and marked this, along with other local landuses on a map of the area. We found agricultural, commercial and recreational land to mark on our own maps and linked this with a key.

When we entered Canford Park SANG, we started to retrieve our sticky knowledge about settlements, thinking about why Bearwood is a good place to settle. We spotted the river which would have been useful for drinking and washing, trees for building and for fires, and flat land for farming. This also linked in with our Year 3 History unit on the Iron Age when we thought about why Iron Age settlers chose Bearwood to build their roundhouses.





After spending the last few weeks learning lyrics, actions, dance moves and sign language, children in Key Stage 2 attended the BSO (Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra) concert at the Lighthouse. Here, pupils had the opportunity to appreciate a variety of orchestral performances - some of which they got to participate in with what they had spent time learning! Pupils (and staff) had a brilliant time enjoying the music and we're looking

forward to future BSO concerts!

Year 6 created posters teaching others about being healthy, using the knowledge from their current French learning.
